ALTO ADIGE (ITALY)

Originally founded in 1970 by A. Giovanette, then taken over by his son, Günther Giovanett in 1985. Continuing in the same tradition as his father, Günther still has close contact with winegrowers, careful selection of the best production areas and well-aimed cultivation of choice varieties

Involved in every aspect of the winery: this passion for winemaking begins in the vineyard with the planting of the vines, advising and working with the winegrowers and continues through the harvest and gentle pressing of the grapes in the cellar up to the vinification of the wines and finally to their marketing. The result of this difficult but rewarding job is wine to be proud of.

Grapes: Kerner

Viticulture: After a short skin contact period (4-8 hours) the grapes are pressed, decanted, and finally fermented separately in stainless steel tanks at low temperatures to retain classic regional qualities.

Alcohol: 13.5% vol.

Appearance: Straw yellow with green reflexes

Palate: Fresh & aromatic. This wine has a high acidity & a spicy aftertaste.

Alto Adige Wine Region of Italy

Climate: Being the most northern region in Italy, Alto Adige has very cold winters (January temperatures average about 32 degrees F) and warm summers (average July temperature is about 84 degrees F).

This region is situated amongst the Alps, and has some of the steepest vineyards in the world (some as high as 3,600 feet in elevation!) This region produces a wide variety of grape varieties that include: teroldego, lagrein, cabernet sauvignon, merlot, riesling, **kerner**, pinot bianco and schiava grigia. The best wines from this region have focus, grip, and a solid presence. There is also a quickly growing sparkling wine industry in this region as chardonnay is prolific throughout the region.

The region of Alto Adige is completely land locked, with the river Adige running through it (the second largest in Italy). Even with such steep hills, vineyards are located throughout the region. Historically, wine has been produced here since Roman times. Once part of Germany

Kerner is a cross between the German grape varieties of Riesling & Trollinger. It is similar in flavor to Riesling but has lesser acidity, and is much more aromatic & full-bodied. It is also easier to produce than Riesling (it can be grown in harsher conditions), and also has much higher yields.
