



**Chateau du Grand Caumont
Réserve de Laurence
Corbières Rouge**
LANGUEDOC-ROUSSILLON (FRANCE)

With 100 hectares of planted vines within the 140 hectare estate in the Lézignon Corbières commune, Château du Grand Caumont is one of the largest wine estates in Corbières. This cuvée is named after Laurence Rigal, the proprietor.

Grapes: 15% Syrah - full berries; 40% Syrah: destemmed; 25% Carignan Noir: 50+ year old vines (vinified in full berries); 10% Carignan Noir: destemmed; 10% Grenache Noir: destemmed - traditional vinification

Vinification: Grapes are vinified separately, then blended in March. 10% aged in French Wood and 90% aged in stainless steel.

Terrior: Gravelly soil and terraces of clay-limestone

Alcohol: 14% vol.

Appearance: Dark garnet with purplish tints

Nose: Blackberry and hints of spice

Palate: Velvety fruit, soft tannins with delicate liquorice spice

Pairing: Enjoy with game such as pheasant, roasted beef or lamb, cheeses and red fruit pies



Languedoc-Roussillon Wine Region of France

Languedoc is usually warm and dry throughout the year and has very mild winters. It borders the Mediterranean Sea on one side of the region, which lends more warmth to the climate.

Languedoc is the largest wine-producing area in France; it produces more wine in this area than in the entire United States. This is also one of the most innovative wine regions in the world today thanks to wine producers that have been changing the wines produced in this area since the 1990s.

A wide variety of grapes are grown in this region including: Syrah, Grenache, Cabernet Sauvignon, and Chardonnay. There are four AOC regions within Languedoc, or wines can be classified as “Vins de Pays d’Oc”.

Corbières is the most highly regarded of all the AOC regions located within Languedoc. It specializes in dense, juicy, rustic, and slightly spicy red blends. Most of the wines are made up of predominantly Carignan grapes with Syrah and Mourvèdre.
